I write to urge the BAR-L to disallow the demolition of the College Lodge, as it is one of the best examples of Mid-Century Modern left standing in the city.

The city would be much better served by a complete renovation and rehabilitation of this landmark building. Much like with the nearby Mendel Rivers federal building twenty years ago, the College has fallen behind on the College Lodge. Yet with the Reivers building, the group behind the Dewberry found a way to preserve both the building and its overall appearance, and also turning it into a profitable - and indeed desirable - hotel on Marion Square. The CofC could find the same functionality while preserving the College Lodge. In addition to the Dewberry, other examples of quality Mid Century Modern rehabilitations abound, from the Starlight Motor Inn in North Charleston, to the Verb Hotel in Boston near Fenway Park. A few years ago, I served on an architectural advisory committee for Beacon Hill, the National Register Historic District in Boston, when the Archer and Donahue building renovations came before us. The Donahue building, like the College Inn, was a contextual Mid Century Modern building that belonged to Suffolk University, though it was classrooms and not a dormitory. The buyers wanted to convert the building to residential, which required a complete gutting and rebuilding of all systems, as well as increased fenestration. The initial proposals were for something more classical ("contextual" the architects thought). We on the BHCA argued that the Mid-Century Modern style was itself worth preserving, and the developers ended up going along with us. The new condos there are a widely-hailed success. Too often in architectural history, there is a temporary valley between when a style is new and modish, and when it is old enough to be considered worthy of preserving. Mid Century Modern has been in that valley for a couple of decades (Post-Modernism is now entering it), and as such we have lost many great examples of the style. Let's not lose the College Lodge as well, especially as we are just starting to realize the value of the buildings in this nifty and stylish postwar vernacular.

I am urging the BAR to deny the demolition permit for College Lodge. As confirmed by the South Carolina State Historic Preservation Office in a letter to PSC dated January 3, 2024, College Lodge is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places - making it a perfect opportunity to restore and rehab not only a local landmark loved by many but a significant architectural resource in downtown Charleston. This building is a powerful contributor to the street, unique in character, scale and setting. Removing it would be a significant step backwards, especially when we know so much about the urban and financial benefits of historic preservation and rehabilitation. On behalf of MidModSC, a statewide organization dedicated to the identification and preservation of South Carolina's Modernist architecture, we thank you for allowing us the opportunity to submit comments on the subject of the demolition of 159 Calhoun Street. We understand the immense task facing the College of Charleston to provide adequate housing for their student body. However, we are not in favor of the College demolishing 159 Calhoun Street, commonly known as College Lodge, and believe a more equitable solution can be found. As part of our advocacy efforts, we launched a petition to save College Lodge from demolition. In the month since the petition went live, over 1600 people have signed it because they believe College Lodge matters. Constructed from 1962 – 1963, College Lodge began its life as a Downtowner Motor Inn. This Memphisbased motel chain eventually had over fifty motels throughout the United States, though most were concentrated on the Eastern seaboard. The Charleston Downtowner was the second location in South Carolina; so far, our research has found a total of five Downtowners (including Charleston) throughout the state—two were in Columbia, one in Greenville, and one in Florence. There may have been more, but unfortunately, the chain did not last long. They began selling off the hotels they owned in the early 1970s. The Charleston Downtowner was sold to the Golden Eagle Motor Inn chain of Charlotte, NC in 1972. It became a dormitory in 1974. While the Downtowner on Main and Lady Streets in Columbia still exists, it has been so altered that it no longer resembles its original form. As far as we know, Charleston's Downtowner is the only intact one left in the state. Additionally, College Lodge is set to be the only visually intact motor inn left in downtown Charleston once the Days Inn is demolished for the new Four Seasons Hotel. While it is clear from the application materials that the College has spent some time studying how the building could be upgraded versus demolishing and building a completely new structure, there are other options. For instance, College Lodge has been determined eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places, its renovation would potentially qualify for state and federal historic tax credits provided that the College partner with a developer. Indeed, the College could even sell the building to a preservation minded developer who could spearhead the rehabilitation, either as privatized student housing or a boutique hotel. In fact, former Downtowner Motor Inns all over the country have been successfully repurposed into studio apartments (Jackson, Mississippi), boutique hotels (Albuquerque, New Mexico), and even dormitories (Savannah, Georgia). Given this information, College Lodge becomes an asset, and not a liability. Charleston is famed for its preservation policies. As a result, the city has one of the largest and bestpreserved collections of 18th-, 19th-, and early-20th century architecture in the United States. Visitors from around the world come here to experience it. For too long

the city's mid-20th century architecture has been forgotten simply because it is not considered visually pleasing; we have reached a point in our history when the stories a building can tell are as important as aesthetics. City officials can begin this vital work by denying College of Charleston's request to demolish College Lodge. Thank you for your consideration of our comments on this matter. Dear Board Members:

The Preservation Society appreciates the College of Charleston for being in communication with us about this request. While we are very supportive of the College's goals for growth and improvement, we do not support the proposal for demolition of College Lodge as a way to achieve those goals. Preservation of this unique, mid-century building is vitally important.

The Downtowner Motor Inn franchise was once a major fixture in many cities across the nation with its identifiable colorful, bold architecture that captured the spirit of middle-class America during this period. Unfortunately, many have been lost or insensitively redeveloped – and today, College Lodge is the last remaining intact example of a Downtowner building in South Carolina.

Upon learning of the proposed demolition of College Lodge, the Preservation Society reached out to the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) to gain an expert opinion on the historic significance of the building. In response, on January 3, 2024, the SHPO officially determined College Lodge to be eligible for individual listing on the National Register of Historic Places. This is a very high threshold to achieve and indicates it is a historic resource worthy of preservation.

Specifically, the state archival historian noted the property is significant because it is “an unusual example of Modernism in downtown Charleston” and “one of the few (if not only) examples of mid-century modern motel design remaining downtown” that conveys “important historical and architectural associations as a postwar Modern motel in Charleston.” Please see attached a copy of the SHPO's letter for reference.

The BAR's charge is to protect Charleston's built heritage, which is made up of layers of history and a diverse architectural landscape. To meet this charge, the Board should defend this building from demolition. As a rare, surviving example of mid-century development downtown, College Lodge contributes to our city's historic tapestry and helps showcase the evolution of our city over time.

Further, the application does not contain sufficient information to justify demolition. The engineer notes there are “no code triggers” to upgrade the building for seismic reinforcement, and the substantial structural interventions being proposed are not required and not a justification to demolish the building. We are pleased to see the engineer finds the building to be in good condition from a life safety perspective and provides a roadmap for repairs to current deficiencies.

In that vein, there have been numerous other examples of similarly aged and styled buildings that have been successfully maintained and rehabilitated – including the 1960s Starlight Motor Inn right here in Charleston, which was in far worse condition than College Lodge and fully and authentically restored, as well as the Savannah Downtowner building that SCAD has sustained long-term as a dormitory with sensitive upgrades that retain the original design.

There is ample opportunity for this site to be creatively redeveloped to meet the College's program goals for new open space, amenities and retail, and even expanded housing, while also preserving the building for continued use, that has not been adequately explored.

Therefore, because of this building's uniqueness, its incredible potential to convey history of its period of development to current and future generations, and its significance that rises to national-level recognition, we recommend the Board deny the request for demolition, and urge the College to pursue a preservation-sensitive rehabilitation. The Preservation Society stands ready to support that effort.

Thank you for submitting a Preliminary Information Form (PIF) for the Downtowner Motor Inn (also known as College Lodge) at 159 Calhoun Street in Charleston, Charleston County. Based upon the information submitted in the PIF, it is our opinion that the property meets the criteria for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion A: Entertainment/Recreation and Criterion C: Architecture at the local level of significance. Please note that this is only the opinion of State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) staff and does not guarantee successful listing. The National Park Service (NPS), not the SHPO, ultimately determines whether or not to list properties in the National Register.

Under Criterion A, the property is significant for associations with the growth of tourism in postwar Charleston. The Downtowner Motor Inn appears to be a rare surviving example in downtown Charleston of the type of automobile-oriented motel that became common across the country in the mid-20th century. Likewise, the property is also an unusual example of Modernism in downtown Charleston. Modernism is not common in Charleston, and the Downtowner Motor Inn appears to be one of the few (if not the only) examples of mid-century modern motel design remaining downtown. Alterations to the building over time have negatively impacted its historic integrity, particularly the painting over of the colored panels on the façade, but it is our opinion that overall the property retains historic integrity and is still able to convey its important local historical and architectural associations as a postwar Modern motel in Charleston. We do not recommend pursuing listing for this property at the state level of significance, as this would require comparison not only with other examples from the Downtowner Motor Inn franchise, but with all similar mid-century motels in South Carolina. It is unlikely that this property would be considered significant within that broader, statewide context.

We recommend the preparation of a formal National Register nomination for the Downtowner Motor Inn. We recommend referencing the National Register nominations for the [Host of America Motel](#) in North Charleston and the [Waikiki Motel](#) in Myrtle Beach as examples. It may also be helpful to reference the nomination for the [Engineering-Management Building](#) in North Charleston to support the development of a local context for Modernism. Please note that these nominations slightly predate the most recent National Register guidance and may not perfectly meet all current technical requirements, but they still serve as good examples overall. Attached (by email only) are forms, instructions, and example nominations. We appreciate your work on the PIF and your interest in the preservation and recognition of this important piece of South Carolina history. We understand the immense task facing the College of Charleston to provide adequate housing for their student body. However, we are not in favor of the College demolishing 159 Calhoun Street, commonly known as College Lodge, and believe a more equitable solution can be found. As part of our advocacy efforts, we launched a petition to save College Lodge from demolition. In the month since the petition went live, over 1600 people have signed it because they believe College Lodge matters. This petition is enclosed.

Constructed from 1962 – 1963, College Lodge began its life as a Downtowner Motor Inn. This Memphis-based motel chain eventually had over fifty motels throughout the United States, though most were concentrated on the Eastern seaboard. The Charleston Downtowner was the second location in South Carolina; so far, our research has found a total of five Downtowners (including Charleston) throughout the state—two were in Columbia, one in Greenville, and one in Florence. There may have been more, but unfortunately, the chain did not last long. They began selling off the hotels they owned in the early 1970s. The Charleston Downtowner was sold to the Golden Eagle Motor Inn chain of Charlotte, NC in 1972. It became a dormitory in 1974. While the Downtowner on Main and Lady Streets in Columbia still exists, it has been so altered that it no longer resembles its original form. As far as we know, Charleston’s Downtowner is the only intact one left in the state. Additionally, College Lodge is set to be the only visually intact motor inn left in downtown Charleston once the Days Inn is demolished for the new Four Seasons Hotel.

While it is clear from the application materials that the College has spent some time studying how the building could be upgraded versus demolishing and building a completely new structure, there are other options. For instance, College Lodge has been determined eligible for listing on the National Register of

Historic Places, its renovation would potentially qualify for state and federal historic tax credits provided that the College partner with a developer. Indeed, the College could even sell the building to a preservation minded developer who could spearhead the rehabilitation, either as privatized student housing or a boutique hotel. In fact, former Downtowner Motor Inns all over the country have been successfully repurposed into studio apartments (Jackson, Mississippi), boutique hotels (Albuquerque, New Mexico), and even dormitories (Savannah, Georgia). Given this information, College Lodge becomes an asset, and not a liability.

Charleston is famed for its preservation policies. As a result, the city has one of the largest and best-preserved collections of 18th-, 19th-, and early-20th century architecture in the United States. Visitors from around the world come here to experience it. For too long the city's mid-20th century architecture has been forgotten simply because it is not considered visually pleasing; we have reached a point in our history when the stories a building can tell are as important as aesthetics. City officials can begin this vital work by denying College of Charleston's request to demolish College Lodge.

Save College Lodge!!

To: City of Charleston Board of Architectural Review

The College of Charleston has recently released a multi-year campus redevelopment plan that includes the demolition of College Lodge, constructed in 1963 as the Downtowner Motor Lodge. This building is the last known Downtowner in the State of South Carolina that retains its original design and architectural characteristics. These buildings have been successfully redeveloped into modern hotels, apartments, and dormitories. In short, there is no reason why the College of Charleston cannot renovate this building and continue to use it as a dormitory. By partnering with a developer, the College could successfully pursue historic tax credits to fund the renovation while creating modern accommodations for its students. Additionally, the College of Charleston features of the first undergraduate historic preservation programs in the United States. The school also partners with Clemson University to offer a graduate degree program in historic preservation. With these resources at their disposal, the College needs to be held accountable for the preservation of this important remnant of the city's recent past.

Why is this important?

College Lodge/The Downtowner is one of the last recognizable mid-century examples of tourism architecture in Charleston. The Downtowner Motor Lodge was a part of a chain of hotels constructed beginning in 1958 (Memphis, TN). The hotel chain is important for bringing the motor lodge concept to urban areas. In the early 1960s, South Carolina businessmen and legislators launched a campaign to turn the state into a destination for tourists. In response, local and national hoteliers raced to construct lodging to accommodate the anticipated uptick in visitors. Charleston's Downtowner thrived as a result of these efforts. Unfortunately, the hotel chain flamed out relatively quickly. But Charleston's Downtowner was acquired by the College of Charleston in 1975 for use as a dormitory. While the College has made past attempts to demolish the building, alumni of the school have vigorously protested as the dormitory has become a favorite amongst the student body in the nearly fifty years since its acquisition. With creative thinking and a commitment to College Lodge's preservation, the building can continue to serve the student body for the next fifty years and beyond.

Once the College files an application for demolition with the Charleston Board of Architectural Review, the petition will be submitted to board administrator for inclusion in the public record.
