Abstract

The collection consists of the papers of Burnet R. Maybank, mayor of the City of Charleston from 1932 to 1938. The papers contain correspondence, newspaper clippings, resolutions, notes and speeches related to the political, economic, and municipal developments occurring during Maybank's administration.

Scope and Content Note

Burnet R. Maybank came to office during a time of worsening financial conditions in the City of Charleston. An increase in municipal services coupled with a decrease in tax revenue in the preceding decades had resulted in a significant enlargement of the city's debt. Moreover, the collapse of the People's National Bank in 1932 wiped out the city's finances. With \$11 million dollars in debt, the city was forced to resort to a scrip plan to pay creditors, as well as employee salaries. Over the course of the next two years, Maybank sought to resolve the city's financial problems through the collection of back taxes, a reduction in the city's operating budget, salary reductions for employees, and refinancing of debt. By 1934 the city was able to return to operating on a cash basis, although many of the city's residents remained in difficult financial situations. Maybank embraced the federal relief programs of Franklin D. Roosevelt's

administration as a means of easing unemployment and making improvements to the city's infrastructure. He likewise took steps to encourage tourism, including the establishment of the Azalea Festival in 1934.

The papers of Burnet R. Maybank contain a wealth of information related to city finances during the Great Depression. Tax assessment and the collection of taxes are topics of special importance. Also of interest are various public works initiatives undertaken during the era, including road improvements and the construction of a municipal swimming pool.
