| 1792-1794 | Served as intendant of the City of Charleston  |
| 1792      | Laid the corner stone for the Charleston Orphan House at the corner of St. Philip Street and Boundary Street (now Calhoun Street)                      |
| 1804      | Death and burial at Limerick Plantation  |
